Building livelihoods, transforming lives



Mission:

To promote economic empowerment and social change by helping the most vulnerable and disadvantaged achieve sustainable livelihoods and by addressing the barriers that limit their participation.

Action on Poverty is a specialised and independent UK based NGO, established in 1984.

With over 30 years' experience, Action on Poverty (previously known as APT Action on Poverty) is focussed on providing economic solutions to address hunger, injustice and barriers to safe and lasting work for marginalised groups in Sub Saharan Africa and South Asia.

We work with partner organisations to help marginalised people access mainstream markets and sustainable livelihoods. We enable them to address their basic rights and the root causes of their poverty, and catalyse wider change.

Key Features:

- 1. Our target beneficiaries: poor and vulnerable people who are particularly marginalised, excluded through their disability, gender, age, HIV/AIDS status, conflict, ethnicity or environment.
- 2. Our area of activity and expertise: Helping people to access markets and livelihoods is our core function.

We assist these target groups to participate in mainstream markets, enabling them to access incomes and to create and/or develop sustainable livelihoods.

We also tackle the reasons for their vulnerability and exclusion, building on the self-reliance and dignity secured through economic solutions to tackle stigma, discrimination and abuse of rights.

We believe the synergy between these has great value.

3. Our partnerships with local organisations, fostering their independent development.

Tackling access to markets and livelihoods enables people to meet their basic needs. Yet even when attention is given to making markets more accessible to poor people in general, wealth differentials occur and the most vulnerable in society are the ones excluded. The reasons for their exclusion are complex and inextricably linked with many aspects of their lives, and require tackling in depth to ensure their basic rights are met and their long term vulnerability is reduced.

We exchange expertise and strengthen capacity according to need and aspiration.





Key Strengths:

- Leaving no-one behind: Specific approaches to accessing, mobilising and supporting those who are hardest to reach
- Helping people and organisations move on from conflict or crisis
- Helping people access markets and livelihoods and secure decent work. Such as stepping up from subsistence farming to being able to respond to changes and opportunities in the market.
- Partner Capacity Building
- Identifying Sustainable Solutions is integrated into all our work.

Technical Assistance (TA):

Action on Poverty provides TA to in-country partners as their needs change and develop. We can work in collaboration with others to source other expertise or directly in the following areas:

• Empowering Vulnerable and Marginalised Groups to access livelihoods

- Proven approaches to breaking down social and economic barriers faced by marginalised groups.
- Proven approaches with groups such as those affected by HIV/AIDS, with disabilities, in fragile environments, impoverished women, and youths to access and sustain livelihoods.
- Development and integration of RBA (Rights Based Approaches) and SLA (Sustainable Livelihoods Approaches) into market led enterprise development and value chain analysis.
- Using livelihoods and associated self-esteem, confidence and independence to tackle stigma.

Market Led Enterprise Development

Action on Poverty can provide wider guidance for market led enterprise development in the project design and during implementation, as well as specific Trainer of Trainer Courses direct to staff, and as they begin to implement their learning such as:

- Market Assessment and training needs
- Value Chain approaches
- Business counselling techniques
- Curriculum development and planning with Vocational Training Centres (VTCs)

Partner Capacity Building

- Project Management e.g. planning support, problem solving, accounting
- o Institutional Development e.g. financial systems development, governance
- Monitoring and Evaluation e.g. systems development, experience of peer reviews
- o Project Development and Institutional Fund-raising e.g. sourcing, specific requirements
